#### Recreation

The rink was closed for the season on April 4<sup>th</sup>, due to poor ice conditions and lack of use over the past month.

Staff has worked on covering the heating pipes and removing unnecessary items from the walls. During this work the old sound system was removed and we would like council to consider declaring it surplus.

The floor stripping and waxing is being scheduled for the end of this month. We would like to finish the L.E.D. conversion before spring clean-up starts. As the budget is not passed I would like council to pass a resolution to allow the purchase of the materials needed prior to the budget completion. The material needed would be items normally purchase every year: floor striper, floor wax and ceiling tiles. The approximate cost of these materials is \$270 for ceiling tile, \$150 for floor striper and \$175 for floor wax.

#### Landfill

There have been some issues with the compactor truck not starting.

Tuesday March 19<sup>th</sup> the truck failed to start at the end of the day. It was believed to have be caused by the fan running after the idle timer shut down the truck.

On March 23<sup>rd</sup> the truck failed to start. The issue was caused because the fuse blew in the trickle charger. The fuses was replaced and the batteries charged.

On March 26<sup>th</sup> the truck failed to start at the end of the day. The connections on the batteries and alternator were cleaned and sprayed to prevent corrosion. The alternator was tested and was working good.

On April 2<sup>nd</sup> the truck failed to start at the end of the day. It was decided that a master switch will be installed and when the idle timer shuts down the truck staff will shut off the master switch to allow the batteries to charge from the trickle charger without the truck drawing any power.

2019-060 SUPPORT FOR TOWN OF SAUGEEN SHORES RESOLUTION NO. 17-2019 RE: RECREATION INFRASTRUCTURE

Moved by Coun Cross and seconded by Coun Grant that the Municipality of Calvin hereby supports Resolution No. 17-2019 passed by the Corporation of the Town of Saugeen Shores as follows: Whereas The Town of Saugeen Shores believes that building modern infrastructure is important, and that good quality infrastructure supports job creation and helps attract businesses and residents to our community and communities across the Province of Ontario; and whereas Recreation Infrastructure is one of the most important core investments that can be made into the prosperity, health, and security of urban and rural communities; and whereas the need for infrastructure renewal projects far exceeds the capital available in municipalities for investment in Recreation Infrastructure; and whereas Recreation Infrastructure is often put to the bottom of the list, as other infrastructure takes priority; in fact, there has not been a meaningful Recreation Infrastructure program since 2008; and whereas the Province of Ontario places long term borrowing restrictions on Municipalities; and whereas Saugeen Shores does not have the borrowing capacity to fund these large scale projects; and whereas some Municipalities do have the capacity to fundraise and borrow to 1/3 of project costs but rely on other levels of Government for remaining partnership funding; and whereas, while the Town of Saugeen Shores welcomes the inclusion of Recreation Infrastructure funds through the Gas Tax Fund, it is apparent that Gas Tax Funds alone are not sufficient to support large scale Recreation Infrastructure projects; and whereas the Town of Saugeen Shores agrees with both Parks and Recreation Ontario and with the Association of Municipalities of Ontario that the infrastructure gap will continue to grow, especially once all of the municipal asset plans are completed; and whereas both the Federal and Provincial Government could leave a positive and lasting impact on rural communities by helping municipalities to renovate or build new Recreation Facilities, and in the process create cost savings to our health system. After all, health is a Provincial expense, and as citizens live healthier lifestyles and maintain healthy bodies, this leads to less frequent visits to doctors' offices, hospital emergency departments and rehabilitation centres, and consequently less costs towards medical costs; and whereas in 2016 the Federation of Canadian Municipalities study found that nearly half of all types of sport and recreation facilities in Canada are in fair or poor condition, with a replacement value of \$23 billion across Canada; and whereas in Ontario, the replacement value for aging pools, arenas and community centres in fair or poor condition in Ontario is estimated to be \$6 billion (Parks and Recreation Ontario); and whereas the Province of Ontario has endorsed the Framework for Recreation in Canada2015: Pathways to Wellbeing; and that the vision for the Framework is "a Canada where everyone is engaged in meaningful, accessible recreation experiences..." and that the first goal of the Framework is that governments should enable participation in physically active recreation; and whereas the Framework for Recreation in Canada has as priority 4.3 as follows: "Enable communities to renew Recreational Infrastructure as required and to meet the need for green spaces by securing dedicated government funding at all levels.... for the necessary development, renewal and rehabilitation of

facilities and outdoor spaces"; and whereas through the Investing in Canada Plan, the Government of Canada is investing over \$180 billion over 12 years in Infrastructure projects across Canada with these investments being made by 14 Federal Departments and Agencies; and whereas the Governments of Canada and Ontario signed a bi-lateral agreement on March 14th, 2017 and created the "Investing in Canada Infrastructure Plan"; and be it resolved that the Council of the Municipality of Calvin requests that the Government of Canada and the Province of Ontario move forward with accepting applications for funding agreed to by the Governments of Canada and Province of Ontario under the "Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program" to help address the Recreation and Culture Capital Infrastructure deficit that currently exists across Canada; and further, that this resolution and background Council Report be forwarded to all Ontario Municipalities, Provincial and Federal Government's, local MP's and MPP's, Parks and Recreation Ontario, and the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, requesting their support. ## 2019-062 SUPPORT FOR TOWNSHIP OF SOUTH STORMONT RESOLUTION NO. 047/2019 RE: ONTARIO MUNICIPAL PARTNERSHIP FUNDING (OMPF)

Dear Mayor and Council members,

As the Secretary-Treasurer for the East Nipissing-North Parry Sound Veterinary Services Committee, I am collecting funds to pay for the contract fees for the large animal veterinary clinics that service our area.

Our veterinary services committee collects the funds from the Townships in the geographic region from North Bay east to Papineau/Cameron and south to Trout Creek. Our area is serviced by the Springer Animal Hospital (in Sturgeon Falls), Dr.Fritz Verzijlenberg and Dr.Norma DeRose from Sundridge. The vets from Sundridge serve the areas in the North Parry Sound region.

We then send the contract fee to the Northern Producer Animal Health Network that represents all the vet services committees throughout the North, from Kenora to Renfrew from Hearst to Muskoka and the Bruce Peninsula. NPAHN is the go between for the Veterinary Service Committees (producers), the Designated Area Veterinarians Association (DAVA) and the MNDM. NPAHN helps the vet committees with problems that may arise with vets and will assist with the cost of looking for new vets, when needed. NPAHN also help vet clinics to bring in summer externship vet students. There are up to 10 students per summer.

The "Veterinary Assistance Program" is administered through the Ministry of Northern Development and Mines. The total budget is \$830,000.00. There are 24 vet contracts across Northern Ontario. This budget covers conditional grants to offset the cost of driving to the clients, locum assistance for vacation coverage and continuing education costs incurred by participating vet practices. At present, the travel grant is \$1.20 per k.m. for the contracted vets to visit the livestock for up to 70k.m.one way (on a return basis). The vets may charge a client that is further that 70k.m. from their base an extra charge. In Southern Ont. where this program is not available the vets are charging \$3.00 per k.m. return to their clients. Once the vet arrives at the farm, the livestock owner pays the call fee and medicine charges. This program covers anyone who owns at least one large animal such as horses, cattle, sheep, pigs, goats, bison, (25) rabbits, deer, flock of poultry, or animals maintained in the production of fur, velvet or meat.

In the North, there are not enough large animals in any area to sustain a large animal vet that does not have to travel a great distance. With the public's concern on animal welfare and healthy food, the vets are the front line professionals that can teach bio security and the proper care and treatment of animals in order to guard against tragic out comes. This program is very important to keep vets in the North.

The East Nipissing North-Parry Sound Vet Services Committee needs a representative from each contributing township. The person can be a council member or a person from the community, preferably someone that would have an interest in the program.

Please inform me of your representative's name, address, phone #, e-mail, so I may contact them for our annual meeting.

Your municipality's contribution for **2019** is \$350.00 and will go towards the \$2000.00 vet contract fee that enables producers in your township to benefit from the Veterinary Assistance Program.

Please make the check payable to the East Nipissing- North Parry Sound Vet Committee and send it to Pauline Carmichael, 470 Galston Rd. Mattawa, Ont., P0H 1V0. Thank you.

If you do not want to contribute to the program, please inform me in writing. Animal owners in your Township will not be covered and will be charged extra by the vets while attending their animals.

If you wish for more information, please do not hesitate to call me. I would be willing to come out to a council meeting to answer any questions.

Narrowed Options for Submitting an Application to Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program and Use of Funding Being Provided by Ministry of Municipal Affairs & Housing and/or

Possible Federal Top-up Gas Tax Funds

#### BACKGROUND

The Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP) is a cost-shared infrastructure funding program between the federal government, provinces and territories and ultimate recipients (municipalities). This program will see more than \$30 billion in combined federal, provincial and other partners in funding over 10 years. The funding is divided into 4 streams – Rural and Northern, Public Transit, Green and Community, Culture and Recreation. The Rural and Northern stream request for applications has been released as of March 18, 2019. <u>Applications are due by May 14, 2019</u>. Applications will focus on projects meant to improve road, bridge, air and marine infrastructure.

On March 19, 2019, as part of the 2019 budget, the federal government announced it will top-up the federal Gas Tax Fund. The additional one-time transfer is expected to be equal to the total amount each municipality received in 2018 (sum of both July and November payments for 2018). The additional funding must be used in accordance with the current agreement with AMO for the transfer of federal Gas Tax funds.

On March 20, 2019, the Municipality of Calvin was notified that they would be receiving a one-time payment to support small and rural municipality's efforts to become more efficient and reduce expenditure growth in the longer term. Calvin will receive a one-time payment of \$206,800 during this fiscal year. While this investment is unconditional with no reporting required, it is intended to help modernize service delivery and reduce future costs through investments in things such as development of shared service agreements and capital investments.







#### Dear Councillors,

Cindy and I purchased the property at 183 Stewarts Road in Calvin Township over 30 years ago. Approximately 7 years ago our family moved here permanently and were welcomed by the township. We plan on retiring in our home on Stewarts Road.

#### **Request for Changes to Stewarts Road**

#### Intentions:

- -year round maintenance on Stewarts Road with no improvements (change of status to year round road)
- -update our building permit for fulltime residence

#### Information:

- -never informed we could not live on Stewarts Road as a fulltime resident
- -Upon moving in as fulltime residents the township provided and spread 14 loads of gravel on Stewarts Road, 2 new culverts were installed, some ditching was done and a turn around for township vehicles was created (2013 and 2014).
- various residents remember the road maintained year round until 1981 then periodically maintained until a few years ago
- -Ken Brewitt issued an occupancy permit. We pay full taxes.
- -in 2016 we requested year round maintenance of Stewarts Road. At this time we were told numerous pieces of information that were not true. Example: there is a by-law that prevents year round maintenance of a seasonal road. After our request the previous council formed a committee to create by-law No. 2017-015 as a so called "solution" to our request that is now an obstacle to overcome.
- -no immediate improvements or costs are necessary on Stewarts Road. Multiple roads in Calvin Township have comparable or lower standards
- -future improvements would be budgeted with all other year round roads and completed as the Township sees fit

#### Summary

Cindy and I feel that every fulltime resident paying taxes is entitled to reasonable standards which is emergency services and roads. We are requesting Stewarts Road be deemed year round with no immediate improvements and our building permit updated. There is no precedent set here because we have a unique situation.

I am pleased to inform you that, in accordance with the commitment in Budget 2019, the Government of Canada will provide an additional \$2.2 billion to the Gas Tax Fund. This one-time top-up will provide additional support to municipalities that face infrastructure deficits to support improved productivity, economic growth, a clean environment, and help to build strong cities and communities.

This special funding will be provided to Ontario recipients under the Canada-Ontario-Association of Municipalities of Ontario-Toronto Gas Tax Fund Administrative Agreement. An amount of \$819,443,895 will be provided to Ontario as well as individual signatories, and will then be distributed to ultimate recipients in accordance with the allocation formula used for gas tax payments made in 2018, as follows:

Funds must be used in accordance with all the terms of the current Gas Tax Fund Administrative Agreement. Information on Ontario's federal Gas Tax Fund allocations per community prior to Budget 2019 can be found on Infrastructure Canada's website<sup>1</sup>.

The gas tax top-up funding is expected to be transferred following royal assent of Budget 2019.

March 14, 2019 marked one year since the Canada-Ontario Integrated Bilateral Agreement was signed.

As I know you appreciate, under the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program, proposed projects must first be prioritized by the province before they are submitted to Infrastructure Canada for consideration.

As a reminder, through the Integrated Bilateral Agreement with Ontario, \$11.9 billion is available to the province and is broken down as follows:

- \$8.3 billion for public transit;
- \$2.8 billion for green infrastructure;
- \$407 million for community, culture, and recreation infrastructure; and
- \$250 million for infrastructure in rural and northern communities.

The one-time top-up to the Gas Tax Fund adds substantial dollars to this Agreement. More importantly, those dollars flow to you.

We believe this is an important step to take to ensure your local priorities have the resources needed so projects can get moving and, crucially, the summer construction season is not missed. We all know how important that season is to make real progress on projects, not to mention job creation locally.

In the meantime, we continue to press the Ontario government to open intakes for all four streams so as to maximize the number of projects we can build together for Ontarians in 2019 and the years ahead.

We know you have proposals ready, and last week's announcement in Budget 2019 is a clear signal that we are there to support you.

Spring is already (at last) in the air. It is time to get projects moving so we do not lose a historic opportunity to build our communities and create good-paying jobs now.

I look forward to continuing to work with you on our shared infrastructure interests.

## THE FEDERAL GAS TAX FUND IN ONTARIO

The federal Gas Tax Fund delivers over \$2 billion every year to over 3600 communities across the country. For the 2018-19 fiscal year, this represents an investment of more than \$819 million from the Government of Canada to Ontario municipalities.

The federal Gas Tax Fund (GTF) is a permanent source of annual funding to provinces and territories, who in turn flow this funding to their municipalities to support local infrastructure priorities.

Every year, municipalities benefit from the support and flexibility of the federal Gas Tax Fund. They can pool, bank, and borrow against this funding — providing significant financial flexibility to plan infrastructure projects over the long term. Projects are chosen locally and prioritized according to the infrastructure needs of each community.

Communities select how best to direct the funds and have the flexibility to make strategic investments across 18 different project categories.

Because many municipalities across Canada continue to face serious infrastructure deficits, **Budget 2019** proposes a **one-time transfer of \$2.2 billion** through the federal Gas Tax Fund to address short-term priorities in municipalities and First Nations communities. This will double the Government of Canada's commitment to municipalities in 2018–19, with **Ontario municipalities of all sizes** sharing an additional federal investment in local infrastructure of over \$819 million, for a total of approximately \$1.64 billion.

## **QUICK FACTS:**

- The federal Gas Tax Fund is allocated on a per capita basis for provinces, and provides a base funding amount of 0.75 percent of total annual funding for Prince Edward Island and each territory.
- On-reserve First Nations communities in provinces also receive an allocation on a per capita basis.
- The federal Gas Tax Fund has been indexed at two percent per year, meaning that it will continue to grow to provide additional support to municipalities.
- To date, more than \$23 billion has been invested in municipalities through the federal Gas Tax Fund.

# THE FEDERAL GAS TAX FUND

Eligible projects include investments in infrastructure for construction, renewal or material enhancement in each of the following categories:



- Local roads and bridges roads, bridges and active transportation infrastructure (active transportation refers to investments that support active methods of travel. This can include: cycling lanes and paths, sidewalks, hiking and walking trails).
- 2. Highways highway infrastructure.
- 3. **Short-sea shipping** infrastructure related to the movement of cargo and passengers around the coast and on inland waterways.
- 4. Short-line rail railway-related infrastructure for carriage of passengers or freight.
- 5. Regional and local airports airport-related infrastructure (excludes the National Airport System).
- 6. **Broadband connectivity** infrastructure that provides internet access to residents, businesses, and/or institutions in Canadian communities.
- 7. **Public transit** infrastructure that supports a shared passenger transport system which is available for public use.
- 8. **Drinking water** infrastructure that supports drinking water conservation, collection, treatment and distribution systems.
- 9. **Wastewater** infrastructure that supports wastewater and storm water collection, treatment and management systems.
- 10. **Solid waste** infrastructure that supports solid waste management systems including the collection, diversion and disposal of recyclables, compostable materials and garbage.
- 11. Community energy systems infrastructure that generates or increases the efficient usage of energy, including energy retrofits of municipal buildings.
- 12. **Brownfield redevelopment** remediation or decontamination and redevelopment of a brownfield site.
- 13. **Sport infrastructure** amateur sport infrastructure (excludes facilities, including arenas, which would be used as the home of professional sports teams or major junior hockey teams, e.g. Junior A).
- 14. Recreational infrastructure recreational facilities or networks.
- 15. Cultural infrastructure infrastructure that supports arts, humanities, and heritage.
- 16. **Tourism infrastructure** infrastructure that attracts travelers for recreation, leisure, business or other purposes.
- 17. **Disaster mitigation** infrastructure that reduces or eliminates the long-term impacts and risks associated with natural disasters.
- 18. Capacity building investments related to strengthening the ability of municipalities to develop long-term planning practices (e.g., including local asset management planning, public transit network planning, etc.)

Note: Investments in health infrastructure (hospitals, convalescent and senior centres) are not eligible.


#### Scheduled Forest Management Operations
